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Logline: Drawn back to his childhood home, James Pickens Jr. is Albert; a man trying to turn the page on long-buried pain. That's how he finds Greta, the current owner of his childhood home, keeper of his past and its hidden secrets.

Allies arrive in unexpected places.


Synopsis: Albert (Pickens) is drawn back to his childhood home on a quiet tree-lined street. Barefoot and seemingly lost, he encounters Greta (Eilis Cahill), the current owner of the house. As she tries to discern the level of truth, sanity, stability-or possible danger-she is facing, an old wound of Albert's past is revealed. Caught in the moment, he is grappling with whether or not redemption is possible when a reckoning is so long overdue.

> Albert's Flower is a taut, heartfelt journey into a present relentlessly haunted by the past, and the courage required to face uncomfortable, unexpected truths about who we are and where we come from...those "flowers" that go untended in our lives.

Albert's Flower stars James Pickens, Jr. (Grey's Anatomy, 42, How Stella Got Her Groove Back) and introducing Eilis Cahill (Mind-Set, MAD); in a directorial-film-debut by award-winning theatre director James Glossman (This World of Tomorrow, co-written with Tom Hanks).









Director James Glossman's Statement:

What do we do with – what do we do about – the maddening, ungainly, exhausting, and sometimes ridiculous baggage we carry around with us, that hurts with every step we take; and at the same time makes us, for good and bad and in-between, who we actually are?

How on earth, even in the most infinite of worlds, did we somehow get here from back there – and more to the point: What do we do NOW?

This is the question, the endlessly exciting dynamic – the Weight of the Past on the Present – that gets me up in the morning as an artist. And it is very much the central core of *Albert's Flower*. Am I the sum of each and every thing that has happened to me, or its hostage? Do we get second chances to make who we are? And more than this: Can the heart, once locked, find a working key?

An old man, at a stark turning point, heads straight back to a long-lost childhood street like it's a red-flashing homing beacon. Something has to happen, right here, right now, before it's too late.

Somebody else lives here now, several somebodies down the line, in the house he grew up in: a young woman raising her family on this weekday afternoon, who knows nothing of the past of this place, of the ground she lives on and its hidden, lost lives.

Can these two people – in this brief chamber piece, this desperately quiet 18-minute pas de deux on the edge of an emotional cliff – can they actually manage to see each other, to find a bridge across the chasm, before one of them tumbles over the edge in the dark?

Anyhow, that's the sealed box *Albert's Flower* is there to snap open.

Project Origination

from Director, James Glossman

In October of 2020, I was sent a new, ten-page play for the theatre by John Pietrowski, my friend since college. More recently, I'd worked with John, directing plays for him at Playwrights Theatre of New Jersey, of which he was the Producing Artistic Director. He decided to go get back to writing after many years as a producer. He asked me to read this short play, Albert's Flower, which he wrote, he told me, as a kind of exercise at the start of the MFA Playwriting program which he'd just began.

As soon as I read it, I called John to say that I loved it - this play with two people on a sidewalk - and would he be willing to let me do it as a benefit reading for a couple of regional theatres. This was after Covid lockdown had begun and actors were doing Zoom readings of plays - or outdoor performances with distanced actors and audience - to help keep otherwise closed nonprofit theatres all over the country alive.

I also asked if I could make one major change in the play as originally written: Instead of the play taking place in 1990, with Albert as a 19-year-old, wouldn't it enhance the power of the piece to place it right now, in the present, and with Albert a man in his late 60s...carrying the weight of his childhood trauma for decades?

Project Origination (continued)

John thought this was a fine idea, and I approached James Pickens Jr. about doing a benefit reading of the play. He read it and said: "I love this script, but I think it should be a film." Something that had never occurred to me, and I was immediately struck that he was absolutely right.

That was as far as we got at that time, however. Jim's TV series, *Grey's Anatomy -* shooting under tight Covid protocols - kept him in LA, and then once theatres were starting to reopen, I got very busy again as well.

Flash forward a couple of years: I was directing *A Tailor Near Me*, a new two-character comedy by Michael Tucker, at New Jersey Repertory Theatre, with James Pickens Jr. and Richard Kind, and somewhere in the first week of rehearsals in NYC, either Jim said to me, or I said to him - and we honestly can't remember

which - "Hey, what about Albert's Flower? Let's do it!"

And that's when Chris Wright came on as Co-Executive Producer to help make the film possible; and then Eilis Cahill came down to Long Branch, New Jersey - where our play was running - for a table read with Jim, and to talk about how we would turn it into a film. It was obvious to us all that the chemistry was right...and we were off and running.

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James Pickens Jr | Executive Producer & Albert

James Pickens, Jr. stars as Dr. Richard Webber for 22 Seasons on the hit series *Grey's Anatomy*. He is a Co-Executive Producer on the series which continues its amazing run winning SAG-AFTRA Screen Actors Guild Awards, multiple People's Choice Awards, and close to his heart, the NAACP Image Award.

He has worked with some of film's finest Directors including Steven Soderbergh (*Traffic*), Oliver Stone (*Nixon*), Warren Beatty (*Bulworth*), and four Barry Levinson films: *Sleepers, Sphere, Jimmy Hollywood, Liberty Heights*. 

A native of Cleveland, James began his career in the theater at Cleveland's legendary Karamu House, the oldest African American theater in the U.S. In NYC, he performed in Charles Fullers' A Soldiers Play at the renowned Negro Ensemble Company with Denzel Washington and Samuel L. Jackson. As a member of the famed Circle Rep/Steppenwolf Theatre he performed in the co-production of Lanford Wilson's Balm in Gilead. He starred as Walter Lee in the 25th anniversary revival of A Raisin in the Sun. He memorably played Dr. Martin Luther King in Crossroad Theatre's Roads to the Mountaintop. He performed with stars Brad Pitt and George Clooney for dir. Rob Reiner in the LA production of 8, based on the Prop 8 marriage equality case. Most recently, he starred with Richard Kind in the world premiere of A Tailor Near Me at New Jersey Repertory Company.

James Glossman | Producer & Director

James Glossman makes his film directorial debut following an acclaimed theater career that includes co-writing and directing the world premiere of Safe Home with Tom Hanks, and directing sold-out benefit readings of Grant & Twain starring David Strathairn and Tony Shalhoub. Named Best Director of the Year by the New Jersey Star-Ledger, Glossman has helmed world premieres featuring James Pickens Jr., Richard Kind, Dan Lauria, and Jay O. Sanders, while his collaboration with the Grammy Award-winning Emerson String Quartet on Shostakovich and the Black Monk has been performed at prestigious venues from Tanglewood to Seoul, South Korea.

His innovative adaptations range from classic literature to contemporary works, including productions with Jack Klugman, William Schallert, and Frankie Faison. As Associate Artist at Shadowland Stages, he has directed theater legends including Richard Benjamin, Paula Prentiss, John Astin, and Orson Bean. His upcoming projects include the world premiere of *This World of Tomorrow* (co-written with Tom Hanks) at The Shed, NYC, directed by Kenny Leon and starring Tom Hanks, Ruben Santiago-Hudson, and Jay O. Sanders; world premiering October 2025.

Glossman holds degrees from Northwestern University, American Conservatory Theatre Advanced Training Program, British American Drama Academy (BADA) - Balliol College, Oxford, and Yale School of Drama (MFA). 


Always fascinated by the expressive possibilities of dramatic narratives, Taiwanese-American composer Justine F. Chen draws inspiration from animation, film, television, theater, classical Indian dance and music, ballet, and contemporary dance. Recent works include Shallow Breath and Stealth, for The Crossing on datamining (text by Jena Osman), a song cycle with poet Ophelia Hu Kinney, and The Life and Death(s) of Alan Turing (librettist David Simpatico) commissioned by American Lyric Theater, premiered by Chicago Opera Theater, and named "Best 2023 World Premiere" by the Chicago Tribune.

Current projects include work with playwright Lloyd Suh (THE CHINESE LADY), a satirical, dystopian choral project with The Crossing, an Asian female Lear chamber opera with librettist Marcus Yi, and a multidisciplinary work inspired by Twa Sisters and Christina Rosetti's Goblin Market.

Chen has been commissioned and performed by: WQXR; The Crossing; New York City Opera; New York City Ballet; The Juilliard School; JACK Quartet; American Composers Orchestra; New York Festival of Song; Washington Ballet; Long Leaf Opera; Chicago Opera Theater; Tapestry Opera; Banff Music Centre; Merola Opera; Bowdoin International Music Festival; and the Brooklyn Philharmonic.

John Pietrowski was the artistic director of Writers Theatre of New Jersey from 1991-2019, a company he helped found in 1986. For the past four years he has been the Director of Arts and Events at the Madison Community Arts Center, a space he designed and programmed over 1100 scheduled events in 2024. At Writers Theatre, he directed over 30 world-premiere productions, including 19 coproductions. As an actor, he has most recently worked at Vivid Stage, Writers Theatre, NJ Rep, Shadowland Stages, and InterAct Theatre in Philadelphia. He received a NJ State Council on the Arts Playwriting Fellowship in 2012 and 2018, and was nominated for a Pushcart Prize in Poetry in 2012. He has taught at Drew, Fairleigh Dickinson, Seton Hall, Centenary, and Kean Universities, as well as Bloomfield College. He is currently teaching at Union County College, and will be directing a production of a new play there in November 2025. He holds a BS in Performance Studies from Northwestern University, a MPA in Nonprofit Management from Seton Hall, a MFA from Goddard College in Playwriting, and a Master's Certificate in Creative Placemaking from the Bloustein School at Rutgers. He lives in Long Valley with his wife, Stage Manager, Properties Designer, and Director Danielle


